Luke 24

What is the Walk to Emmaus?

- A spiritual renewal program intended to strengthen the local church through the development of Christian disciples and leaders
- A short course in Christianity, comprised of 15 talks by laity and clergy on the themes of God's grace, disciplines of Christian discipleship, and what it means to be the church
- Wrapped in prayer and meditation, special times of worship, and daily Communion



Where Did the Walk to Emmaus Originate?

- Adaptation of Roman Catholic "Cursillo" (Spain 1949)
 - Cursillo de Cristianidad means "little course in Christianity"
 - Program designed to empower persons to transform their living and working environments into Christian environments
 - Expanded to Episcopalians & Lutherans 1960s-70s
 - Upper Room of General Board of Discipleship adapted 1978
 - Further Refined 1981 and name changed to The Upper Room Walk to Emmaus



What is the Aim of the Walk to Emmaus?

- To inspire, challenge, and equip local church members for Christian action – in their homes, churches, workplaces, and communities
 - 3-Day Course in Christianity moves members to new levels of openness and commitment as disciples
 - Reunion groups regular meetings for accountability
 - Teams of servanthood
 - Local church involvement



What Happens on an Emmaus Weekend?

- Three days filled with singing, learning, laughing, worshipping, reflecting, praying, and participating in small groups.
- Fifteen talks given by laity and clergy centered around the theme of God's grace and table group discussion
- Daily celebration of Holy Communion
- Experience God's grace through the prayers and acts of anonymous service
- Become equipped for new levels of grace-filled service and leadership

What happens at the tables?

- Listen together to the talks
- Discussion of each talk (personal sharing is confidential)
- Preparation of a poster or skit summarizing the table discussion
- Presentation of talk summaries and posters/skits
- Laugh, cry, pray together



Why are men and women on separate weekends?

- Focus is on the individual's spiritual life
- Gives married persons individual time to explore their relationship with God
- More open sharing
- Men often make spiritual connections with other men, and women with other women
- Some are single, or have spouses that are not on a walk
 - No one feels left out



Who Should Go to Emmaus?

Emmaus is open to members of any Christian denomination.

Emmaus is for the development of Christian leaders who:

- Are members of a local church
- Have a desire to strengthen their spiritual lives
- May have unanswered questions about their faith
- Understand that being a Christian involves responsibility
- Are willing to dedicate their everyday lives to God in an ongoing manner.



What should I know before attending?

- Emmaus is for active church persons
- Emmaus is for people who want to grow spiritually
- Emmaus is mainstream in theological outlook
- Emmaus is for building faith and discipleship
- Emmaus is for fostering unity in Christ
- Emmaus is a concentrated 3-day course in Christianity



What will be expected of me?

- Be yourself
- Come with openness
- Be present for the entire three days
- Leave your world behind for 72 hours (an emergency phone number will be provided)



What Happens After the Emmaus Weekend?

- Participants are invited to have a closer walk with Christ for the rest of their lives.
- They are encouraged to:
 - Expand their spiritual life through worship, study, and active participation in their local church
 - Become more active disciples of Christ in service to the world
 - Encourage one another in accountable discipleship
 - Pursue opportunities for servant leadership



How Can Emmaus Benefit Congregations?

- Stronger spiritual discipline
- Increased willingness to serve as teachers and leaders
- Deepened hunger for regular Holy Communion
- Increased participation in Bible Studies
- Increased faith sharing and witnessing to Jesus Christ
- Intensified eagerness for evangelism and mission
- Increased giving of time, talents, and resources



Potential Pitfalls

- Walking to Emmaus and never leaving
- Making Emmaus their church
- Acting cliquish or elitist
- Talking about Emmaus as if it were secretive
- Viewing Emmaus as exclusive
- Attending Emmaus for the wrong reasons
- Failing to understand the potential of Emmaus



How do I register for a weekend?

- Prayerfully consider whether Emmaus is right for you, and whether the specific weekend is the best fit
- Find a Sponsor
- Complete application and give to sponsor
- Registration fee \$235 includes room, 8 meals, and weekend supplies
- Scholarships are available NO ONE WILL BE DENIED THE EXPERIENCE DUE TO COST!!!



What is the role of your sponsor?

- Prayerfully consider whether Emmaus is right for you
- Complete a sponsor form to be sent with the application
- Bring you to and from the weekend
- Provide support to your family, etc. as needed during the weekend so you can leave the world behind
- Prayer and other support for you during the weekend



When and Where are the Walks Held?

 The Southern New England Walks are typically held twice a year at Cathedral Camp in East Freetown, MA
